# Filing Tips and After you file

- Filing Deadline is April 18th
- File a complete and accurate return electronically to avoid refund delays; choose direct deposit
- Most refunds sent in less than 21 days; some require further review and take longer including returns that:
  - Include errors/Incomplete
  - Identity Theft
  - Include an Injured Spouse Form
  - Require additional review in general
- The IRS will contact you if additional information is needed

# **Should you Claim Recovery Rebate Credit?**

- Qualifying individuals can receive up to \$1,400 for themselves and qualifying dependents.
- If you're eligible, you'll need to file a 2021 tax return even if you don't usually file to claim 2021 Recovery Rebate Credit.
- You will need the amount of third Economic Impact Payments received to calculate 2021 Recovery Rebate Credit amount using the 2021 RRC Worksheet or tax preparation software.
- Letter 6475 is sent to tell you how much the IRS shows you received.



# Reconcile advance Child Tax Credit payments

- You may receive up to \$3,600 for each child age 5 and under, \$3,000 for each qualifying child age 6 through 17 at the end of 2021
- No income is required to claim this credit for 2021
- Compare the advance Child Tax Credit payments that you received during 2021 with the amount of the Child Tax Credit that you can properly claim on your 2021 tax return.
- The IRS is mailing you a Letter 6419 to provide the total amount of 2021 advance Child Tax Credit.



## **Qualifying for the Credit:**

- You can receive a credit of up to \$4,000 for care expenses for one qualifying person and up to \$8,000 for two or more qualifying persons
- You must have qualifying expenses for child or dependent care while you worked or looked for work
- Qualifying person must be under age 13 for the days the care was provided during the tax year, or be physically or mentally incapable of self-care
- You must have earned income
- The Child and Dependent Care Credit is claimed on Form 2441

#### Who can claim an education credit?

There are additional rules for each credit, but you must meet all three of the following for either credit:

- 1. You, your dependent or a third party pays qualified education expenses for higher education.
- 2.An eligible student must be enrolled at an eligible educational institution.
- 3. The eligible student is yourself, your spouse or a dependent you list on your tax return.
